Seeing Through Lies: Plato on How to Avert Tyranny

The Paper:

Building on an argument in *Poetic Justice* about the *Republic*'s distinction between deception and falsity, this paper argues against the longstanding conviction that the *Republic* sanctions lying in the name of justice, brings to light the connections in the dialog between lying and tyranny, and makes the case for the key role of mimesis in seeing through lies.
