The author

Ian Hunter is Emeritus Professor in the Centre for the History of European Discourses at the University of Queensland. He is the author of several studies dealing with the history of early modern philosophical, religious, and political thought, most notably *Rival Enlightenments* (Cambridge, 2001) and most recently *The Secularisation of the Confessional State: The Political Thought of Christian Thomasius* (Cambridge, 2007). He is presently working on a book on the history of poststructuralist theorising.

The paper

In order to develop a properly historical comparison between Kant's philosophical cosmopolitanism and Vattel's law of nations, one must first work out how to historicise Kant's metaphysics. This is the precondition for situating Kant's cosmopolitanism as expressing the outlook or 'stance' of a particular kind of intellectual culture and faction, thereby enabling it to be situated alongside (not above) Vattel's law of nations, the expression of a different kind of outlook and culture.
