## Republicanism and Egalitarianism: A Historical Perspective

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## The author:

Annelien de Dijn is a Professor of Modern History at the University of Utrecht. She focuses on the history of political thought, in particular the history of republicanism and liberalism. She is currently finalizing her second book, Freedom: An Unruly History, which is under contract with Harvard University Press and which traces the history of freedom from Herodotus to the present. Her first book, French Political Thought from Montesquieu to Tocqueville: Liberty in a Levelled Society, appeared in 2008.

## The paper:

This paper has two main goals. First, it highlights that early-modern republicanism was an egalitarian tradition; i.e., that their commitment to freedom as nondomination led republican thinkers to argue for social equality. Harringtonian republicans in particular were explicit about this commitment, even though their arguments for egalitarianism have been strangely neglected or misrepresented in the existing historiography of republicanism. Second, the paper shows why Harringtonian egalitarianism should be of interest to contemporary political philosophers, in particular to neorepublicans and to relational egalitarians.
