Professor Skinner holds the Regius Chair of Modern History in the University and is a Fellow of Christ's College. He is a Fellow of many academic academies and has been the recipient of numerous honorary degrees. The author or co-author of more than 20 books, his works have been very widely translated, and his two-volume study, The Foundations of Modern Political Thought, was named by the Times Literary Supplement in 1996 as one of the hundred most influential books published since the second world war. His scholarship has won him many prizes, including the Isaiah Berlin Prize of the Political Studies Association, the Lippincott and David Easton Awards of the American Political Science Association, in addition to the Wolfson Prize for History in 1979 and a Balzan Prize in 2006.

Research Interests

I am chiefly interested in the intellectual history of early-modern Europe, and within this area I specialise in two related fields. One is the culture of the Renaissance, especially early Italian art and the evolution of humanist moral and political thought. The other is seventeenth-century political philosophy, in particular the philosophy of Thomas Hobbes, on which I have published two books and numerous articles.

I am also interested in a number of more purely philosophical issues. I have written on historical explanation, on the nature of interpretation more generally, and on several topics in contemporary political theory, in particular the concept of political liberty and the character of the State.

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
